

\*\*\* As we mentioned in an earlier post, we will be implementing changes for the upcoming season, and most of these will likely become permanent.

\*\*\* Shipments outside North America require a level of USDA Qualification which we choose not to pursue, so as in the past, we cannot accommodate orders from overseas countries; there is no change in this policy.

\*\*\* What has changed is that we will be providing shipments to the USA and its territories only, and the result of that is we will no longer be shipping to Canada. However, that doesn't mean that Canadian visitors cannot purchase plants from us, it is just a little more complex.

\*\*\* Canadians wishing to purchase plants would need to pick-up and transport those plants across the border themselves. Although phytosanitary certificates are not required for exports from the USA, they are available to assist for import into Canada. We can arrange for a phytosanitary inspection for your order, but we would require lead time to arrange for the inspection; this would normally occur in advance of your pickup date, and the cost would be \$31/USD for non-commercial orders under \$1250/USD.

\*\*\* We would suggest that Canadian visitors inquire with CBSA (<https://cbsa-asfc.gc.ca/menu-eng.html>), CFIA (<https://www.inspection.gc.ca/eng/1297964599443/1297965645317>), and Revenue Canada (<https://www.canada.ca/en/revenue-agency.html>) for information on transporting live plants and requirements for import. Daylilies (Hemerocallis) are duty free between the USA and Canada, but you may be required to remit GST/HST.

\*\*\* Just to reiterate, although Phytosanitary Certification is not mandatory for export, it is highly recommended for import, and we take no responsibility for complications arising at the border due to the lack of certification.
